COVID-19 FINANCIAL MEASURES PUT IN PLACE BY GOVERNMENT BUSINESS SUPPORT

1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 This report summarises the various financial measures put in place by Government to support businesses as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

2. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

2.1 The Business Continuity Committee are asked to consider the financial measures put in place by Government in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

3. DETAIL

- 3.1 Due to the COVID-19 outbreak all non-essential businesses must close. There is information on the Scottish Government website in respect of which business premises are permitted to remain open. The Scottish Government is advising all business premises, sites and attractions to close unless:
 - essential to the health and welfare of the country during this crisis; or
 - supporting (or being repurposed to support) essential services; or
 - capable of working in a way which is fully consistent with established social distancing advice; or
 - wider public health, health and safety or other considerations apply and require a facility or service to continue to operate or a specific period of time for a safe shutdown process to be completed.
- 3.2 The UK and Scottish Governments have announced a package of support to assist businesses. You can find out more at <u>COVID-19 UK Govt Support for business</u> and <u>FindBusinessSupportScotland</u> and more information is contained within Appendix 1.
- 3.3 The business support offered includes:
 - Business Support Grant £10,000 or £25,000 available to nondomestic ratepayers
 - Job Retention Scheme
 - Self-employment Income Support
 - Business Interruption Loan Scheme
 - Non-Domestic Rates Relief
 - Support for businesses who are paying sick pay to employees
 - Deferral of VAT payments
 - Defer Income Tax for Self Employed.

- 3.4 The Council is administering the business support grant and an initial advance of the funding (80%) was provided to Council's on 1 April, with the remaining amount to be disbursed at a later stage. As at close of business on 6 April 2020, there is approximately 1,300 emails relating to business grants (some will be applications, others will be queries or follow-up to information requested) and 446 applications have been processed. By grant type, 418 have been processed for the £10,000 grant with 390 approved and 49 processed for the £25,000 grant with 37 approved.
- 3.5 The Council have launched a Coronavirus Caring for People helpline and this is set up to help with all types of advice linked to coronavirus. The number is 01546 605524. Information on support for businesses is also on the Council website within the Coronavirus Help and Advice section and is updated regularly.

4. CONCLUSION

4.1 A number of financial measures to support businesses have been announced by the Government in response to the COVID-19 pandemic as summarised within this report.

For Income Tax Self-Assessment, payments due on the 31 July 2020 may be deferred until 31 January 2021.

The deferment is optional. This is an automatic offer with no applications required. No penalties or interest for late payment will be charged if you defer payment until January 2021. You do not need to be selfemployed to be eligible for the deferment
